2104/1395 Chairman's announcements

2104/1402 To consider a response from the Westward Ho! Park Committee regarding wildflower meadow

Members were advised that the area behind the tennis courts, which is a slightly banked area can be gated and a wildflower meadow created. It was

suggested that Cllr Hames liaises with the Volunteer Community gardeners. Westward Ho! Park Committee were also happy for a bike rack to be installed and consideration given to recycling bins. A contribution from the Climate Emergency budget will be welcomed.

2104/1403 To consider Northam Sustainability App update

Ms Hill and Cllr Chalmers have had a meeting with Petroc and had a discussion about marketing. It may be necessary to involve another group to look at marketing. Ms Hill advised she needs help from other people to prepare a project plan, nothing has been circulated yet through the college because of the Covid restrictions. Cllr Chalmers had nothing further to add.

2104/1404 To consider Life on the Verge

This has been put forward as a project to Town Projects. Maps have been sent out suggesting verges which could be left uncut. Life on the Verge looked at the site by the Golf Club and other areas which have been sent to the Neighbourhood Highways Manager. It was suggested that we invite the Neighbourhood Highways Manager to the next meeting to discuss "Life on the Verge". If he is unable to attend Members would like a detailed response. It was **resolved** to explore two areas, one at Northam and one at Silford. meeting and if unable to attend ask for a detailed response.

Members were also advised of the "Quiet Lanes" app which is not currently supported by Devon County Council.

DRAFT LETTER TO RESIDENTS OF CHIRCOMBE LANE

Dear Sir/Madam

Following Northam Town Council's declaration of a Climate Emergency and its commitment to reduce carbon emissions in Northam Parish we are keen to encourage cycling and walking as alternatives to car use and we have discussed a number of possible cycle/walking routes which would link various parts of the Parish to Bideford and further afield, forming, we hope, part of an overall plan for Barnstaple, Bideford and Northam.

One of the proposed routes is from the junction of Churchill Way and Heywood Road to follow the existing cycle path to Limer's lane and then down that Lane to turn right along Chircombe Lane to reach Bank End. The route would then run parallel to the river through to the main Bideford car park and on to the Quay.


This route would form a valuable strategic link with Bideford and we are hoping it can be extended across the Long Bridge, past Brunswick Wharf and then join the Tarka Trail along which the main centres of Torrington, Barnstaple, Braunton and Ilfracombe could be reached.

We are writing to you as a resident of Chircombe Lane to ask for your support for the part of the route proposed to go along this lane. At present the lane is a designated public footpath but to make it a cycle path the Council would have to apply to Devon County Council to designate it a bridleway.

We very much hope that you will support this application which if successful would produce positive benefits to the area in terms of reducing carbon emissions, providing a safe transport link to Bideford, improving public health and benefitting the local economy.

Northam Town Council Sustainable Procurement Policy

Our Sustainable Procurement Policy is part of the Council's wider policy on procurement which fundamentally seeks to drive a culture of securing good value for money from our contracting activities and one that ensures best outcomes for residents and customers.

Sustainable Procurement means improving the efficiency of our commercial spend to deliver major social and environmental benefits within the local community and nationally; to the extent that we can use our purchasing power, either unilaterally or by combining with other public sector organisations, to influence the supply market. Furthermore, it is the process that takes account of the economic, social and environmental impacts of our purchased goods, services and works on people and communities whilst still delivering value to these communities.

Within this policy we are making it clear that we intend to significantly improve our contracting approach and change the way we engage with the market. Whilst there are situations where contracting with a 'big' supplier to deliver a service will provide better control and process efficiencies, we also recognise that contracting with smaller, medium size organisations can enhance quality of service and provide better options for service users. It is for this reason that we are strengthening our commitment to work more closely with local and SME suppliers and we seek to deliver more innovative solutions through this approach

Before making a purchasing decision the Council will always assess the need for making the purchase, aiming to avoid unnecessary consumption and if a purchase is then deemed necessary to then investigate the possibilities of re-use, repair or recycling.

The Council's Sustainable Procurement Policy is based on three main themes – Environmental, Economic and Social Sustainability - and will conform to the following principles:

Environmental:

- Reduce carbon emissions and mitigate the impacts of climate change
- Increase the proportion of renewable energy and the use of energy efficient products
- Increase the percentage of reused, recycled and sustainable or ethically sourced materials, resources and products
- Reduce the percentage of waste to incineration
- Reduce water use
- Promote biodiversity
- Promote food and agricultural practices that enhance the health and welfare of people and animals

Economic:

- Promote use of local products and services
- Create job opportunities for local people, including NEETS, and increase the number of apprentices in employment
- Address the issue of worklessness through providing training and job opportunities
- Engage effectively with the third sector, SMEs, and HE and FE institutions
- Influence the supply chain to deliver sustainable procurement

Social:

(This policy follows the principles of the Ethical Trading Initiative (ETI) Base Code, which was founded on the conventions of the International Labour Organisation (ILO) and is an internationally recognised code of labour practice.)

- Freedom of association and the right to collective bargaining
- No discrimination is practised;
- Employment is freely chosen;
- Working conditions are safe;
- Good health is promoted;
- Working hours are not excessive;
- · Wages meet at least national legal standards;
- Regular employment is provided;
- Training is provided;
- · Clear dispute procedures are in place;
- Child labour is eliminated;
- · No inhumane treatment is allowed;
- Acting with integrity and transparency
